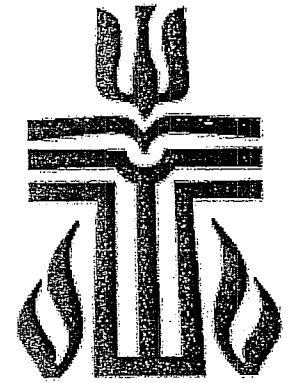

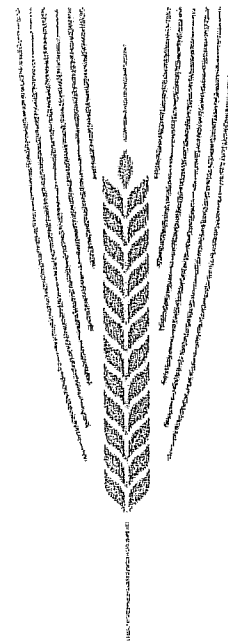

(See Psalm 104:24.)
- While making the nose, pray, "I'm sorry for the times I've turned up my nose at your many gifts."
(See James 1:17.)
- While making the mouth, pray, "Let everything I say please you."
(See Psalm 19:14.)
- While lighting the candle, pray, "Lord, help me show your light to others through the things I do."
(See Matthew 5:16.)

After carving your pumpkins, display them as examples of how God's love transforms us into new creations. (See 2 Corinthians 5:17.)

Hymning and Hawing

The Sound Is Gone Out To All Lands

When I was taking my undergraduate degree, it was not, in any recital hall, studio, or classroom, considered acceptable to use a microphone for performance. Most of the auditoriums, recital halls, chapel, and so on were considered acoustically resonant enough that no microphone would be needed for performances, be they vocal or instrumental. That, indeed, was also the case (and is also the case) in many of the churches I have toured when in Europe. The beautiful marble walls, lack of carpet or pew-cushions, and stone joists and ceilings make for a very resonant space. But, though we are blessedly more comfortable with the innovation of cushions on our pews and carpets on our floors, these creature comforts do not enhance the resonance of our worship space.

For some singers it is still a matter of pride that they need never use a microphone when singing in a church or recital hall—they have a powerful enough voice to fill the space. At least, so they believe. In some churches they are correct—I recently attended a memorial service in a very acoustically “live” sanctuary, and no microphone was necessary. I took notice of the walls, how instead of being flat they had a regular pattern of angles and non-parallel flat surfaces for the specific purpose of reflecting sound. I am certain this measure was much more expensive than a flat wall, and it made the space beautifully resonant. One truly did not need a microphone to sing in that sanctuary. But, as was discussed in a conversation with a performing concert tenor soloist recently, no longer is that the norm in churches and recital halls.

Many churches, in fact, rather than spending money on an acoustically designed resonant space, sink their funds into an elaborate sound system—one that requires specially trained technicians to operate it. This training has become a part of church ministry, in the same way that being trained as an organist or cantor is. But a great number of sanctuaries just aren’t acoustically “live” enough for all singers to be heard without microphones, and it is not shameful for singers to admit that listeners hear them more clearly with the aid of electronic devices. Non-acoustic designs, coupled with the natural absorbency of cushions, carpets, and people—and their clothing—create an utterly different venue for singing from that enjoyed (?) by singers of Handel’s day or even Mozart’s day.

Having recently done my master’s degree recital at HHPC, I was under the traditional constraints not to use microphones, except for recording purposes. I have also observed, in the last several years of service from different pastors in our church, the number of them who state, “Oh, I have a big voice, they can hear me all right if I don’t use a microphone.” Well, I can hear them, but there are some whose hearing “isn’t as good as it used to be,” and those people hear the sermon—and anything else the pastor says, no matter how big-voiced—if a microphone is used. And even if some can hear the pastor, they get more out of the sermon if they don’t have to strain to hear it.

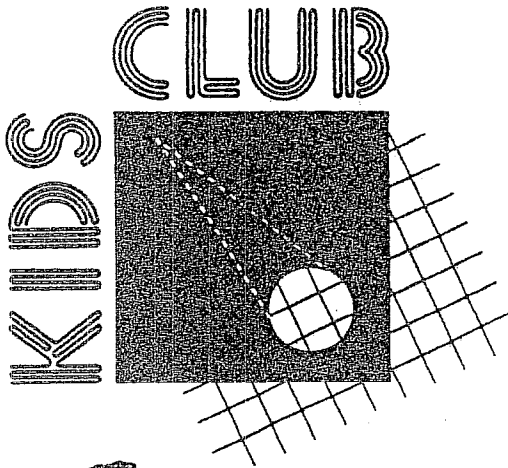
The same is true of singing. We’ve all heard what some people thought they heard as permutations and parodies of song words, and it’s not necessary for me to go into some of those here (though if you’d enjoy revisiting some of those, see the brain-teaser at the end of this column). What we all must accept, ministers of Word and Music alike, is that it enhances the worship experience for all to be able to participate with not only the hearing but the understanding also. If someone is deaf, we would be sure and turn toward them when speaking so they could read our lips. If someone is a little less able to hear, therefore, we use a microphone for their comfort. Their being included, and being able to participate, is far more important than our self-image that we don’t need a microphone to be heard. Truly, the sound of the Gospel will be “gone out to all lands”—and to all corners of our church as well—and in all corners it will be heard and understood.

I can’t say for sure that this ever was a seriously mis-heard phrase, but one anthem, based on a hymn and using the hymn text, was referred to in the HHPC Senior Choir for years as the “purple-headed monster”. This was a permutation of the actual phrase starting out one verse. What is the actual phrase, and what is the hymn?

And one notorious clergyman who lived many years ago was noted for a particular type of “slip of the tongue”, having introduced hymns such as “Kinquering Kongs Their Titles Take” and “Shall We Rather At The Giver?” Who was the clergyman, and what is the name of the “slip of the tongue” forever associated with him?
