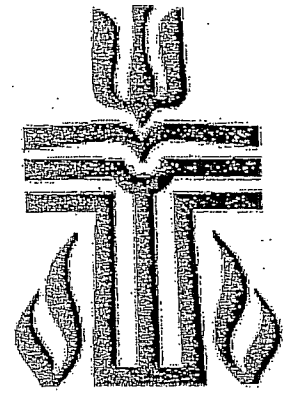

## Minor Ministerial Musings

Have you ever wondered what I mean when I sign off my newsletter articles with the phrase “in joyful anticipation”? Anticipating means waiting for, or expecting, doesn’t it? What am I waiting for, then? Am I implying that this moment isn’t as wonderful as the next will be, that the best is yet to come, or even that things can only get better from here on out? As a follower of Christ, and as a believer in the death, resurrection, and glorification of Jesus Christ, I do believe that “the best is yet to come” in a lot of ways. I believe that the complete fulfillment of God’s Kingdom, the new heavens and the new earth, have not arrived yet. One need only watch the news, or even just look around your own neighborhood, to know that sin and death and evil still exist, and I live with a fervent hope for a time when poverty, injustice, sickness, war, hunger and homelessness will trouble God’s creation no more. I hope for a day when the Lord will wipe away the tears from our eyes, as we are promised in Isaiah. But the realization that we are not there yet is not a disappointment, not by a long shot. Just because I hope for a day that has not yet come, does not mean I don’t recognize this day as a day the Lord has made, a day to rejoice and be glad.

So . . . what am I still anticipating? And can I balance the anticipation of a day yet to come, with the appreciation of the day I’m living now? If I am serious about my belief in the death, resurrection, and glorification of Christ, and if I take seriously all that it means to follow Christ, the answer is a resounding “yes!” As I anticipate a day when we will no longer need the light of lamps or even of the sun, because the Lord God will be our light (see Rev. 22:5), I can’t wait to see what comes between now and then.

I have been here at Hickory Hills for only one month, and I have already seen how active and intentional this congregation is about loving God and neighbor, in so many ways – mission trips, prayer, fellowship, just to name a few. And this month we have Rally Day, which is the beginning of so many things I *haven’t* seen yet, things I’ve only heard about, and can’t wait to experience. Not only will Sunday School begin once again, but we are adding a new class. And of course, there is the beginning of another year of Kid’s Club, choir, bells, and Bible study. During the next few months, we will observe the changing of the seasons, witnessing the glory and miracle of God’s creation as leaves change color and fall, as snow falls. And then there is the joyful season of Advent, marked by Hanging of the Greens, music, and the reading again of some of the most familiar and beloved stories in the Scriptures. There is so much to experience, so much to learn – and so much to remember.

As we begin this new phase of the church year, it is so important to keep in mind our purpose, our focus in all that we do, as a congregation, as committees, as small groups, and as individuals. It is important to remember that all we do should reflect our love for God and neighbor, and our desire to follow God’s call on our lives. As Rally Day gets closer, and as we earnestly prepare for this year’s activities, I am so encouraged by our mission statement: “We are called to SEEK God’s word, to SHARE and CELEBRATE God’s love, and to SERVE Jesus Christ in the world.” Is it any wonder, then, that I live each day...

We turn on the light each Tuesday evening at 6:30 p.m., no need for a flash light, you are light enough.

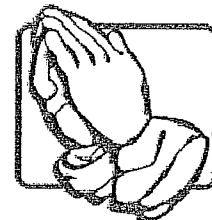

## PRAYER & CARE

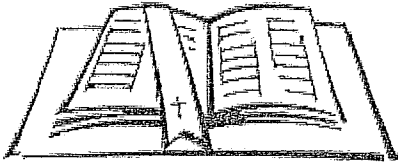
“O Lord, you are my God; I will exalt you and praise your name, for in perfect faithfulness you have done marvelous things, things planned long ago.”

## WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY

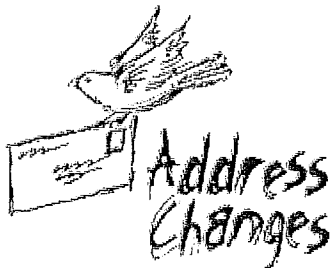

## ANNUAL CRAFT BAZAAR

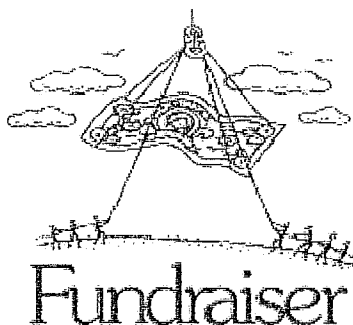
SATURDAY, NOV. 6<sup>TH</sup>

- While making the mouth, pray, "Let everything I say please you."

- While lighting the candle, pray, "Lord, help me show your light to others through the things I do."  
(See Matthew 5:16.)

## Singing Our Songs in a Strange Land

Sharing songs—a primitive custom from ancient times, yet with echoes in our own modern culture. The medicine man of a tribe trades songs with another tribe's medicine man. A wandering bard of one Celt city brings its songs and legends to another city, or another country. A slave people is invited to sing some of its songs before its conquerors (though the Psalms point out that this can be a mockery instead of a genuine desire to learn about an unfamiliar culture).

It still happens in our own day. A music fraternity increases its brotherhood by active members holding "listening sessions" of favorite music for the pledge class. A teen-age girl expresses interest in a teen-age boy by inviting him to her house to listen to some music (and he brings some of his own CDs to share). People from one church take time on the Kentucky mission trip to share some of their favorite Christian contemporary songs with other church members; they, in turn, share their favorites with their home congregations when they return from the trip.

By sharing songs, cultures were shared, and friends developed deeper knowledge of each others' differing backgrounds. In some cultures, part of the celebration of a wedding included the bride and groom teaching their friends, and the others in the village or tribe, new songs, stories and games. In a Star Trek novel, two bards from different cultures shared songs and then wished each other the "peace of dreaming on shared songs."

Through a culture's art forms, much of their identity can be communicated and much learned even by generations which follow, even when there are no survivors of the original culture. Such a great deal is learned by archaeologists about Egyptian daily life by the paintings found in the tombs, not solely of pharaohs and their immediate families, but the tombs of the middle-class—the merchants, the chantresses in the temple, the teachers, the scholars. Yet the sharing of songs surpasses the sharing of art, for it can be a spectator or a participatory activity, and it can be reciprocated as easily as the human mind can call up a different song.

Even in the coffeehouses of Cairo, according to one early-twentieth-century account, it was the custom for a storyteller to sing a well-known legend of an evening. His hearers knew the legend and were able to join in on the chorus. It's hard to imagine such an event occurring in a Starbucks in downtown Chicago, but I have conducted concerts and sing-alongs in coffeehouses in northwest Indiana and was joined by the audience enthusiastically and (sometimes) in harmony. In many of the historical incidents described above, the singing of traditional songs with sing-along choruses came as naturally to the culture as the ability to join in "Happy Birthday" comes to present-day Americans.

When we as present-day Christians share songs, the act has two vital components. Not surprisingly, they are *sharing* and *song*. To share anything with another—be it a song, a story, or a plate of potato salad and ham—yields the obvious surface act of giving, plus on a deeper level it is a communication. When we do it, it adds recommendation—"I find this to be good and I think you will find it to be good also" is the subtext. A further subtext is "I care about you, and because I care about you, I wish to share with you something I find to be good, believing that you will find it to be good also."

And song? In a Christian context, song is often a sharing of knowledge about God's power, a sharing of adoration of God, a sharing of rejoicing in God's love, or a sharing of exhortation to fulfill the Christian obligation (be it mission, ministry, or compliance). Yet, like the icons of the Eastern Orthodox church, the presence of song helps to transport the worshiper into an other-worldly experience of God. The Western Protestant churches on many occasions find their other-worldly experience through music. Coupling this meaning with the subtexts above regarding sharing, the message we may attach to Christians sharing songs with each other is, "Because I value and esteem you, I want to share with you an experience I find to be good, an experience which transcends the mundane/worldly: the other-worldly experience of Jesus Christ, which I believe you will find good since I find it so."

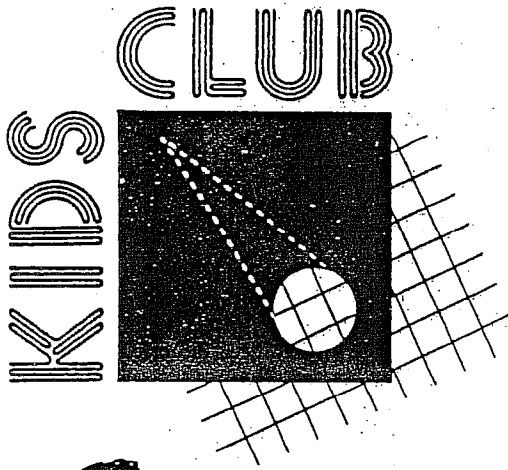
Let us then, with this rationale in mind, share songs with each other, with Christian and potential Christian alike. And may we not hesitate to sing the songs of the Lord in a familiar, yet often very strange, land.



## **“Developing a Christian Worldview”**

Starting  
September 12, 9:00AM

Have you ever asked yourself any of the following questions: How do I know that God exists? Does science conflict with the Bible? Do evil and suffering disprove the existence of God? What evidence for Jesus exists outside the Bible? Is there historical evidence for Jesus' resurrection? How did we get the Bible? What happens to me after I die? If so, then the class “Developing a Christian Worldview” is for you! In “Developing a Christian Worldview,” you will learn what Christians believe and why they believe it. You will have the freedom to ask anything you want to know about Christianity but may have always been afraid to ask. And you will gain a solid knowledge of the Bible and essential Christian doctrine in the process.

Taught by Dr. Kirk MacGregor, visiting assistant professor of theology at Quincy University and author of several books and articles, “Developing a Christian Worldview” will integrate study of the Bible with science, church history, theology, apologetics (defense of the Christian faith), and other fields. The class will feature a simple, easy-to-understand presentation style suitable for anyone high school age and up. The class will give high school students, college students, and adults the intellectual resources to know why attacks on their faith are false. And it will teach them how to effectively and persuasively share their faith with non-believing friends, family members, teachers, and colleagues in a non-confrontational way. Concerning outreach, anyone skeptical of Christianity is more than welcome to attend the class, where they will have an open forum to find answers to their questions.

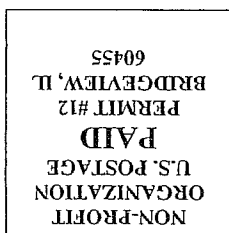
